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RULES

OF The

BOROUGH OF SOUTH SHIELDS

VOLUNTEER LIFE BRIGADE.

- 1.—That this corps be called "THE SOUTH SHIELDS VOLUNTEER LIFE BRIGADB," and its object is to assist the Coast Guard in saving life in cases of shipwreck.
- 2.—That this corps consist of enrolled members (effective and non-effective), and honorary members; the latter contributing to the funds of —the corps, but not enrolled for service.
 - 3.—That the affairs of the corps be managed by a secretary, treasurer, and a committee of twelve effective members, to be elected annually by the enrolled members of the corps. The chief officer of the coastguard to be a member of the committee ex officio
 - 4.—The members who are passed as effective by the district commanding officer shall elect annually the company officers in the proportion of two to each fifty men.
 - 5.—Candidates for admission to the corps must be nominated by two members, and admitted or rejected by a majority of the committee present at its next meeting.
 - 6.—That the committee meet monthly for the transaction of business, and that five of their number be a quorum.
 - 7.—That all officers of the corps shall be lected by a majority of votes, each member entitled to vote being supplied with a list of members, and a voting paper to be filled up and presented personally to the presiding officer.
 - 8.—That each member shall be provided with

- a distinguishing badge, as may be agreed upon by the committee, which shall be worn at drill or on active service.
- 9.—That the property of the corps be vested in the committee
- 10.—When the corps is assembled for drill or actual service, each member shall yield implicit obedience to his superior officer, and discharge the duty assigned him as quietly as possible.
- 11.—That in all cases when the volunteers are called together, either for drill or actual service, the officer of Coast Guard in charge at the station shall take the command; but should their be (from any unforeseen cause) no Coast Guard officer present, then the command shall be taken by the chief officer of volunteers present.
- 12.—That insubordination on the part of any member shall be followed by immediate dismissal from the brigade, on the offence being fully proved before the committee.
- 13.—That the committee shall cause an abstract of the accounts to be prepared annually for the information of the members of the corps
- 14.—That any gentleman shall become an honorary member of the corps on payment of a guinea annually.
- 13.—That any member of the corps wishing to alter any existing rule, or propose a new one, shall give notice in writing to the secretary fourteen days previous to the annual meeting.

N.B.— The Signal to the Volunteers that a Ship is an Shore will be a gun fired twice,in quick succession, from the Spanish Battery, and as soon after as may be a Coloured Rocket fired in the direction of the Town.

MONDAY EVENING FEBRUARY 12TH 1866

Present Rennoldson (Chairman) Maxwell, Blair, Tynemouth, Crisp, MacRay, Stevenson and Malcolm.

Proposed by Mr Maxwell seconded by Mr Blair that each member of this committee be requested to use his best exertions to raise a Fund for the benefit of the Brigade and that Mr A Stevenson act as Treasurer pro tem.

Proposed by Mr Rennoldson seconded by Mr MacRay, that the distinguishing badge of the Brigade be a belt of white girthing with the letters V.L.B. worked in red.

Proposed by Mr Stevenson seconded by Mr Blair that the Secretary write to Mr Byrne Coastguard officer Tynemouth and request him to bring four of his men to act as head of sections till this Corps be efficient.

Proposed by Mr Stevenson seconded by Mr MacRay 1st that the Board of Trade letter be published. 2nd that two advertisements announcing the first drill to be inserted in both the Daily Papers, and 3rd that 50 bills be posted announcing the same.

Mr Stevenson resigned the office of joint Secretary and also kindly offered to get printed 150 copies of the rules and the same number of cards with the Drill instructions for the use of the Brigade.

MAY 2ND 1866 PRESENT

The Committee met on this occasion for the purpose of examining the Voting Papers for the election of 4 Captains and 12 Committeemen.

The 4 members who received the highest number of Votes for Captain were Messrs W Cay 68 votes, Stephen Cottew 57 Mathew Cay 51 and Thomas Tynemouth 40. They were accordingly declared elected.

The 12 members who received the highest number of Votes to serve on the Committee were Messrs J Crisp 54, R Blair 46, S Stevenson 44, Joseph Smith 38, Luke MacRay 36, J P Rennoldson 36, S Malcolm 34, W Wright 33, Geo Stokoe 31, T A Wilson 30, Geo Smith 26 & Charles Pearson 26

It was resolved to announce the above result in the papers and at the next Drill and not at a General Meeting of Members as previously agreed on.

LETTER TO SHIELDS GAZETTE REGARDING AN APPEAL FOR FUNDS TO THE READERS TO COMPLETE THE PROPOSED WATCH HOUSE

SOUTH SHIELDS VOLUNTEER LIFE BRIGADE

Sir, —Allow me, through the medium of your valuable paper, to bring before the public the claims of the above brigade on their liberality and support. As will be seen in another column, a perfect hurricane swept along our coast early on Sunday morning, bringing destruction to several vessels, and, in all probability, to several lives, but for the timely efforts of the life brigade and others who were present. It is the desire of every man connected with this institution that it should be the most efficient in the kingdom, and it is very evident from what has already occurred this year, and last year also, that its formation has not been in vain. During that time they have saved from a watery grave about forty persons, among whom were a woman and her infant child. While we are willing to risk our lives in this noble cause, we confidently hope that the public will come to our assistance, and provide us with funds for efficiently carrying on our work. At present we are having a watch-house built on the South Pier for the accommodation of the members in stormy weather. The Board of Trade and others have come to our assistance, but still we are greatly deficient in the necessary funds for completing it. It is the wish of the committee not only to rescue the poor sailors, but also to supply them with those comforts so necessary in their helpless condition. During the recent disaster we had 26 men thrown on our hands, more dead than alive, from the great exposure they had undergone, without being able to administer to their comforts, save the warmth derived from a fire. The consequence was the greater part of the poor fellows had to walk more than a mile through sleet, snow, and wind, before they could get dry clothing or anything to eat or drink. It is our wish to have all these necessaries in our new watch house, which can only be done by liberal response to this appeal. For this purpose, by the permission of the bankers of the town, subscription lists will lie at their establishments. Donations will also be thankfully received by any of the committee or myself. In conclusion, I may state, we stand in the proud position of being the first volunteer brigade in the United Kingdom that has saved life from shipwreck, and while we are still willing to give our, services and expose ourselves for our suffering fellow creatures, we trust our efforts will be seconded by the public, that they will identify themselves with our success and liberally sustain the prestige we have already gained.

SOUTH SHIELDS VOLUNTEER LIFE BRIGADE

ANNUAL MEETING

The first annual meeting of the South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade was held in the new watch house last night. Alderman Glover was called to the chair, and there was a large attendance of members and those interested in the prosperity of the institution. Among those present were—Alderman J. F. Spence, secretary to the Borough of Tynemouth Life Brigade; Messrs John Robinson; J. W. Lambe; M. Cay; S. Malcolm (secretary); Dr. Stokoe; J. Crisp; and S. Cottew and T. Tynemouth (captains), &c., &c.

The Chairman said he had been called upon most unexpectedly to fill the chair this evening. Although unexpectedly, he had great pleasure presiding for five minutes, or half an hour, or whatever the length of time might be, over meeting of the members of so noble a body the South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade. (Applause.) After stating the object of the meeting, the chairman called upon Mr Malcolm (secretary) to read the report.

Mr Malcolm read the report, as follows:-

"The committee, in presenting the first annual report to the members of this institution will endeavour briefly as possible to give outline of the transactions of the Brigade since its formation. The establishing of Life Brigades in general is of recent date, and to Tynemouth will ever belong the honour of organizing the first brigade, on the model of which this and other brigades have been established. To establish one on this side of the mouth of the Tyne, a few gentlemen met together in December, 1865, and formed themselves into provisional committee. A public meeting, convened by the Mayor, was held in the Town Hall early in January, 1866, and, the 31st of the same month, the services of 47 volunteers who had enrolled themselves members were accepted by the Board of Trade, from which date the South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade was officially established. The first drill took place at the south pier. February 17th, 1866, under the command of Mr Byrne, of the coastguard service. The movement soon became popular, and in a few weeks the roll had increased to one hundred and forty, and now reaches to two hundred men who have attended drill. The necessity for it soon became apparent, for on the night of April 2, the schooner "Tenterden," of Sunderland, came ashore behind the South Pier during a heavy gale. Forty-five members were speedily on the spot, and, under the superintendence of the Coastguard, succeeded in rescuing the crew, 5 in number, and a woman and her infant, from a watery grave. Without further detail the members have attended 9 wrecks, the crews amounting to 57 all told, and of which they have been instrumental in saving 30 lives, the rest, with the exception of two boys, being saved by the lifeboats or were enabled to get ashore themselves. In the fearful gale of January 6, 1867, these two boys were drowned, one by getting into a boat which was swamped, the other being washed off his vessel by a heavy sea. During the past long and severe winter the members have been very much exposed to storm and tempest while pursuing their arduous and perilous vocation. It soon became evident that something would have to be done provide for their comfort while on duty. An appeal was made the public for funds to erect a watch-house, and the liberal response enabled us to erect the comfortable and commodious building we now occupy. Your committee takes this opportunity of thanking the subscribers for their sympathy, and those gentlemen who have given us the useful instruments which adorn its wall. Our thanks are also especially due to P. J. Messent, Esq., the piers engineer, for furnishing the plans, and rendering valuable assistance during the erection. While the committee have been mindful of the comfort the members in general, they also contemplate providing before the winter sets in an additional room especially adapted for the accommodation of shipwrecked crews, and they are encouraged by the hope that their intentions have only to be made known when the necessary facilities will be afforded for carrying out this much needed project. We have cause for congratulation that this Brigade during the first year of its existence has been enabled to distinguish itself so much, especially in being the first institution of the kind to save life from

shipwreck. This we say, not from any boastful superiority in point of efficiency, because we believe had other brigades been similarly situated a like success would have attended their efforts in the noble cause for which these establishments have been instituted. In conclusion, we hope that the South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade, successfully launched, will continue to be a permanent institution of the town, that each member will be stimulated in the future by the events of the past, and, in the words of our motto, will be "Always ready" to risk their lives to save any poor manner who may be wrecked on our coast."

In the absence of the Treasurer (Mr A. Stevenson), Mr Malcolm also read the financial statement, which showed that the income of the Brigade during last year was £195 17s Id, and the expenditure £179 9s 9d, leaving a balance of £16 7s 4d. This sum, added to which £25 they had been promised from the Board of Trade, would make £41 odd, which would be applied towards defraying the expenses of the new room they intended to build before the winter set in.

Mr Wilson moved the adoption of the report and in doing so expressed his admiration of the way in which the Secretary for the Brigade had performed his duties during the past year.

Mr Robt. Bell seconded the motion.

Ald. J. F. Spence, North Shields, said the Chairman had asked him to say few words, and although he did not attend the meeting with the intention of addressing them he had had very great pleasure in expressing his admiration of the report which he had just heard read. He congratulated the South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade on being the first to save any lives in the kingdom. They on the other side, being the older institution of the two, were naturally desirous to be the first to save life, but when they heard of what their friends in South Shields had done he for one—and he might speak for the whole of the members of the Tynemouth brigade—rejoiced to think that they were the first whose services were called into requisition with such important results. He considered it a great honour, and thought there was not a more laudable movement, or one more calculated to raise men in the estimation of their fellow-men than that in which they were engaged. They had already saved many lives when in peril and their success he ascribed to diligent practice, and the state of efficiency in working the apparatus to which they had attained. They all remembered the loss of the Stanley, and he could confidently assert that if Mr Byrne had had twenty-five disciplined men to aid him on that occasion, many valuable lives might have been saved. (Hear, hear.) He did not like to see men acting who were totally unacquainted with the apparatus they were handling.

When everyone knew his business, the chances of saving life were more favourable than when the force was composed of nothing better than the rabble. He rejoiced to think that the South Shields brigade had attained such a high standard of proficiency, and he was delighted to see many of the members present. He hoped they would never fall short of the motto at the end of their report, as he was sure they would not, and although he did not wish to see wrecks, he hoped, when they did occur, that they would be as successful in saving lives as they had hitherto been. (Applause)

The Chairman then put the motion approving of the report, and afterwards scrutineers were appointed to go over the votes recorded for the election of officers during the ensuing year. Mr Wilson said he was pleased to see many of their worthy supporters present. It had been their study as officers of the institution to give all their friends satisfaction. Their humble endeavours to save Life had been very successful, and he hoped they would always be ready to do what lay in their power for their fellow-men when they required their services. He wished to propose, as most of the members of the brigade were working men, in regard to the money that the Board of Trade awarded, that it be distributed among those who were the means of saving the life of shipwrecked crews, to buy clothes and boots, as there was great tear and wear upon them, and they could not be replaced unless some assistance was given. If the meeting approved of the proposal he was confident that the public would supply them with the necessary funds to provide the food that might be consumed. He had much pleasure in submitting the resolution to the meeting.

Mr Wm. Spence seconded the motion, which was unanimously agreed to.

Capt. Cottew proposed a vote of thanks to the Secretary and Treasurer. Since the institution of the Brigade they had conducted its affairs in way which had given entire satisfaction to its members. Mr McQueen seconded the motion, which was carried amid vociferous cheering.

Mr Malcolm replied. He was very much gratified to think that his services had been highly appreciated. For any trouble he had been caused he thought himself fully rewarded by the success of the Brigade. They were successful in their very infancy, for after the third time they had been at drill they had to put what they learned in theory into practice, and were able thereby to save a ship's crew.

He hoped since they got on so well last year that they would still go on progressing. On behalf of the Treasurer, who, he had no doubt, would duly appreciate the motion just made, and himself, he begged to return thanks.

Mr Malcolm proposed a vote of thanks to the Captains. It was necessary to have leaders or captains in an institution of this kind, and he was sure those who had experienced the storms and wrecks of last year would admit they (the captains) were at least well worthy of vote of thanks. If re-elected, he had no doubt they would continue to discharge their duties in an equally satisfactory manner.

Mr Wilson seconded the motion, which was carried by acclamation.

Captain Matthew Cay being unavoidably absent, Captains Cottew and Tynemouth briefly replied. Mr Wilson then moved that Dr Stokoe should be elected doctor to the Brigade. Mr Bell seconded the motion, which was agreed to.

Mr Cay said although he had not the honour of being a member of the Brigade, would take the liberty, as fellow townsman and an old tar, of telling them much he admired their institution. He had always been impressed with the idea that on their iron bound coast there were places where for many miles a lifeboat was of no use. This objection had been seen by the Board of Trade, and for many years they had been thinking of the line and rocket. They had now tried to introduce it, and he was proud to say that they had been so far successful. The benefit to be derived from such means of saving life was incalculable, for, Mr Spence stated, had the rocket apparatus been in use when the Stanley came ashore, a number of valuable lives might have been saved. He thought Tynemouth and South Shields should produce the two best Brigades on the coast. There were plenty of men competent for the work, and with the spirit of humanity which they evinced, he had no doubt they would do great amount of good in the way of saving valuable lives. He was only sorry that there was not some way of remunerating those who watched night after night, but hoped that they would come to that by and by, as it could not be expected that people could always work for nothing. He was very unfit to say anything the subject. He had risen merely for the purpose of introducing his friend Mr Robinson (applause), who, he had doubt, could say something better worth listening to than anything he could say.

In conclusion he hoped that there would be no strife between the Tynemouth and South Shields brigades further than an honest emulation to who should do most to promote the welfare and happiness of their fellow-men. (Applause)

Mr Robinson then addressed the meeting. After stating that he had not heard the report read, which he regretted and that he was very glad to see such an enthusiastic and numerous meeting, he spoke of the benefit of having good captains, and the necessity there was for those who were under their command being thoroughly trained. He trusted that the members of the South Shields brigade would attend to discipline and training, so that when the time for action came they might be able to perform their duties with efficiency, and credit to themselves. Mr Robinson then spoke of the moral benefit coming to the members of the brigade from the philanthropic nature of the work in which they were engaged. When they felt they were doing good to their fellow creatures, they were doing good to themselves. There was no satisfaction in man working only for his own benefit. If they wanted to promote their own happiness they must seek to promote that of others. (Applause) In conclusion, he trusted that the society would go and prosper. He hoped their services would not be called too often into requisition, but storms would rise, and ships would be wrecked, and he trusted hen these occurrences did take place that every member of the Brigade would be found at his post. Many people had predicted that the volunteer movement would not last, but to-day it was as vigorous ever, and it was great benefit to many young men. He trusted that their voluntary efforts would be the same to the end, and he hoped they would have the thanks of their townsmen for their labours. (Applause and cheers.)

Mr Malcolm thought that.it was desirable that those gentlemen who contributed to the funds of the brigade should know how the money had been expended. He therefore moved that the report and financial statement should be distributed among the subscribers and members. The motion was seconded by Mr Smith, and agreed to.

The Chairman proposed a vote of thanks to Mr Wilson for the interest he had all along taken in the institution, which was enthusiastically responded to.

Mr Wilson replied.

The scrutineers not having their task finished the time the other business of the meeting over, an interval elapsed, during which the members of the Brigade were treated to a plentiful supply of refreshments. On the list being made up, the following were found to have the highest number of votes, and were declared duly elected office-bearers for the ensuing year: —

LETTER TO ASSISTANT SECRETARY AT THE BOARD TRADE

July 25th 1867

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that the Watch house of the So Shields Vol. Life Brigade is finished and in the terms of your letter (5056W) we are entitled to £25 granted by the Board of Trade.

Referring to your letter (M 227) requesting to be informed whether the Watch House will afford sufficient accommodation for shipwrecked crews, I beg to state it does not, and that we intend commencing immediately with an additional room specially fitted up with every requisite for shipwrecked mariners.

From the tenor of your letter I infer that the Board of Trade will be willing to render us further assistance.

To carry out our views will require an expenditure of about £80. From the annual statement which I enclose you will see the public have subscribed very liberally to the Fund which was in recognition of our services at the wrecks in January last and which has been spent in the manner set forth in the Treasurer's Account.

The Members, many of whom are poor have had hard work during the past Winter, and at the Annual Meeting it was resolved that the money received on account of wrecks, such be divided amongst those present at such wrecks to pay for loss of work and destruction of clothes.

The Annual Returns to June 30th 1867 were forwarded in due course to the Inspecting Committee of this district.

LETTER REGARDING THE SAVING OF 2 MEN FROM A SMALL BOAT AND MEDICAL CERTIFICATE FOR HENRY STEPHENSON

South Shields Aug 6th 1867

Sir,

I take the liberty of bringing before the notice of the Board of Trade a very gallant and courageous action recently performed at the mouth of the Tyne.

The circumstances of the case are as follows:-

On the afternoon of July 28th 1867 a small boat containing 8 persons, was, owing to some mishap driven among the broken water of a heavy sea at the entrance of the above river. In consequence she was swamped and the occupants thrown among the boiling surf. A boat was speedily manned by 5 pilots, who at the imminent risk of their lives succeeded in rescuing 2 men who had clung to their boats bottom.

They also picked up a woman, but it was found on reaching the shore she was quite dead. Had it not been for the heroic conduct of these brave men the whole of the unfortunate people would have been drowned.

I enclose a medical certificate respecting Henry Stephenson, who in his eagerness to render assistance, fell among some rocks which threw back his hand, and split it open. The brave fellow nothing daunted got into the boat and managed with great skill to steer her on her dangerous errand.

I may state that this is only one among many like deeds that have been performed by the pilots of the Tyne and it would be a fitting opportunity of publicly recognising it, not only for the benefit of the men in question, but in letting their comrades and the public in this neighbourhood see that such deeds are appreciated by those in Authority.

I would respectfully suggest that this is a fitting case to be recommended to her Most Gracious Majesty as worthy of being granted the Albert medal and I have no hesitation in saying should such an honourable decoration be awarded it would have

a most beneficial effect in stimulating others to try and do likewise.

The names of the men are; Robt. Young, Thomas Brown, William Stephenson and Robert Tynemouth.

Dear Sir,

Before writing you on this matter I thought it better to see how the Insurance of the Watch House would be affected by the proposed addition. I enclose a letter relative thereto from which I infer the room will have to be quite independent of the present House. I have consulted with the Insurance Agent here and he thinks a foot space between them will be sufficient. However, before it can be built, I must have a guarantee from the Board of Trade that they will take all responsibility in case of an explosion.

I think it might be arranged not to keep cartridges in these premises.

A great deal depends on Mr Byrne with whom it will be better if you consult not only on this point but also on the internal arrangements of the Rocket House.

I would suggest if powder has to be kept; that a lined with bricks and cement and covered with iron plate, should be provided for the purpose under the floor.

I think a room 14 feet square will be large enough, with the ridge running parallel to that of the old room. Capt. Robertson wished provision made for getting a Gear Cart in and out if necessary.

Sir,

At the request of the Committee I take the liberty of bringing before you notice of the present financial position of the South. Shields Volunteer Life Brigade.

Our income from all sources since the formation has been about £260 and our liabilities to the present time £283 leaving a deficiency of £23 which is required to pay the outstanding accounts in connection with the additional room for shipwrecked crews just completed. The public have subscribed very liberally hitherto and we hope the B of T will give us some further assistance to clear off this debt.

In a previous letter I gave you an outline of the services rendered by Members in cases of shipwreck. We think the B of T ought to come to some decision as to the grant we are entitled to for such services. This will be applied not to the general expenses of the Brigade but for providing suitable clothing to necessitous members while on night duty.

We also understand Brigades have been furnished with waist belts gratuitously. Ours have cost 18 guineas or 1/9 each. As we were unaware of the above arrangement we hope the B of T will take into consideration whether we are entitled to have the money refunded.

IMPULSE AND PAYMENT

South Shields Sept 30th 1868

Sir,

I have the honour to report that the Schooner "Impulse" of Maldon from Rochester in ballast came on shore at the entrance of the Tyne on the 27th inst. and that the crew were rescued with the Rocket Apparatus by the Members of the South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade under the superintendence of the Coastguard.

I beg also respectfully to remind you that the Members of this Brigade have attended 9 shipwrecks previous to the above and have brought ashore altogether 37 people, for which we have received no grant according to the instruction in the Wreck Circular issued by the Board of Trade.

We are now without funds which makes it very important that an allowance should be made at once as the winter is still before us. It would simplify the matter if a scale of payments were adopted and I would suggest that for every person brought ashore from a wreck a grant of £1 should be made and for the Brigade attending a shipwreck without saving life a sum of £5.

DISPUTE OVER PAYMENT OF GRANT

25th February 1869

My dear Sir,

Last week I received from the Board of Trade, the sum of £15 as the Grant to our Brigade for the ending June 1868.

I take the liberty of bringing this before your notice because I think there must either be a mistake or a very invidious distinction between the South Shields Brigade and the Tynemouth Brigade, the latter having received £20 for a like period. Apart from services at wrecks I think no arguments can be stated to show there should be a difference in the Grants and I am at a loss how to convey accurately the indignation of the Committee at what I may call "shabby" treatment of the Board of Trade.

When you also consider we have been at between 12 & 20 shipwrecks and saved nearly 40 lives, it is plain these are good grounds for dissatisfaction so much as that it was nearly resolved to send the £15 back again. How cans this be reconciled with the terms of the Wreck Circular relating to these payments a disregard to which is considered by us as a breach of faith and it is my decided opinion if payments have to be made at all they will never be on an equitable footing until a scale is adopted for certain services. In the present case the money is doing more harm than good and this coupled with the overbearing conduct (of which you have been made fully aware) of an Inspecting commander at the recent Hawser Experiments at Tynemouth will have a tendency very much to impair the efficiency of the Brigade.

In these remarks we are actuated by no selfish motives. This is not a question of money so much as of simple justice that we wish properly adjusted, or in other words to take our position with other Brigades relatively to work accomplished.

Whether the Board of Trade adopt money or merit as their standard of showing a Brigades efficiency we are equally willing so long as we stand in our right position.

I take the liberty of writing you on this subject because intimately as your acquainted with the working of Brigades you will be able to represent our case in the proper quarter and I trust with good effect. This I intended to be a private communication but if you think it should be official I am quite agreeable.

I beg to state that if the sum awarded for attendance at the monthly exercises of the Rocket apparatus is in proportion to the sums awarded to other Brigades for life services we are quite satisfied.

What however I wish to impress upon you is that the Board of Trade with one exception quite ignores the services we have rendered at shipwrecks.

I am quite aware that in the period for which the last Grant was paid no wrecks occurred consequently my letter referred to wrecks anterior to that. The exception mentioned was the case of the "Tenterden" wrecked Apr 2nd 1866 whose crew of 5 hands & woman & child were saved by us. For this we received £5 12 6. I submit a list of wrecks only at which life has been saved, leaving out numerous others to which we have been summoned and would simply ask as it was thought proper to make a Grant for the "Tenterden" whether it is not also proper to treat the other wrecks in a similar way.

BRAVERY AWARDS FOR THOMAS HOUSLBY, J.G. FOLEY &GEORGE HERON

South Shields

June 22/69

Sir,

I have to report that on Tuesday June 15/69 our Coast was visited by a tremendous gale from the N.E. which was attended with loss of life and much destruction of property. About 10 o'clock P.M. the Members of the S.S.V.L.B. on duty at their Watch House were alarmed by the sound of the Signal Guns from the Tynemouth Coastguard Station signifying that a vessel was in distress and that the services were required. The Rocket Apparatus was got out and taken along the Pier. When near the end a Rocket was seen to go up in the neighbourhood of Manhaven about 2 miles off. At the time the wind was blowing a complete hurricane and the rain coming down in torrents. The Members after great exertions arrived in time to assist the Coastguard in getting up the Cliff the crew of the Schooner Anne of Rye.they got back to the Watch House in a most pitiable condition and quite exhausted about 12 p.m.

It was known that a great number of fishing boats had gone to sea in the afternoon which gave Members additional cause for anxiety and they had just returned from the Wreck at Manhaven when a fishing smack was driven ashore.

Being under the lee of the Pier the crew got out themselves and were brought to the Watch house where they received refreshment and dry clothing. Satisfied of their safety about 20 of the Brigade although very unfit, were able to save all the poor fellows nets. They were scarcely finished when another boat was seen to drive ashore mid-way between the Pier and the Rocks. The Brigade proceeded at once with the Rocket Apparatus where under the superintendence of the Coastguard a Rocket was fired and communication effected.

This was done by the men standing up to their middle in the surf. No response being made it was thought there was no one on board or that they were helpless. Thomas Houlsby volunteered to go off with a belt and rope attached to him. At the time the boat would be about 150 yards from the shore and the sea breaking up over her.

After great struggles and much difficulty he succeeded. He also hauled the whip-line off which was made fast by one of the 3 men who were on board. The chair in being hauled off fouled among the nets and wreckage. Houlsby in a most courageous manner got the man on his back , jumped into the surf and was hauled ashore in a very exhausted condition having to be conveyed to the Brigade House for medical assistance. The belt and line were then fastened to another Member who was however so exhausted by previous exertion that he had to give up.

There upon Mr J.G. Foley of Blackwall volunteered to go on board. His assistance was gladly accepted as the Members had been up all night and a great part of that time in the water. On getting aboard he found a man sitting at the front of the mast quite benumbed and so stiff that he was unable to get him into the breeches buoy. He came ashore but went off again and put a clove hitch round the man's body when he was hauled ashore. In doing this Foley got entangled among the ropes and had a narrow escape of being drowned. Dr Winter whose untiring exertions are much to be praised succeeded in bringing them round. The third man left on board was underneath the sail and broken spars and was supposed to be dead. Foley again volunteered to go on board and was closely followed by George Heron. They cut the sail and to the joy of all the poor fellow was brought ashore alive.

I may state that it is only within the last month that Heron was the means of saving the lives of the crew of a salmon boat which had got among the broken water and on former occasions he has distinguished himself in a similar manner.

It is impossible for me to convey a correct idea of the fatigue and exertion of the S.S.V.L.B. but I think the B. of T. ought in some special way to mark its appreciation of the conduct of

LETTER TO BOARD OF TRADE REGARDING FIRING OF GUNS BY H. M. S. CASTOR

Oct. 31st 1870

Sir,

I am requested by the Committee of the South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade to inform you that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have ordered the discontinuance of the firing of Signal Guns on board H.M.S. "Castor" in cases of shipwreck.

The original arrangement for summoning the volunteers was by firing Guns from the Coastguard Station at Tynemouth. It was found that with certain winds the reports were not heard at South Shields. This was represented to the Board of Trade in the winter of 1867 by myself after which it was arranged with the Admiralty that the "Castor" stationed in Shields Harbour should repeat the Tynemouth Signals. This has been found to answer very well indeed and we are surprised to hear of the above decision without any previous consultation with us as to its advisability.

As it was through the Board of Trade that the arrangement was made for the "Castor" to fire her guns we most respectfully request that the B. of T. kindly enquire into the matter.

Sir,

My attention has been directed to a paragraph in your issue of 10th inst referring to the loss of the barque "Henry Cooke" with all hands at the mouth of the Tyne.

You begin by throwing out some doubt as to the efficiency of the Life Saving Apparatus and follow it up by saying that it would be hard to satisfy the public that the lives could not have been saved.

Now by these statements a reflection is cast upon the crew who worked the Rocket Apparatus on that occasion viz the Members of the South Shields Life Brigade, and they are highly indignant, and justly so, as the writer of the paragraph could have no idea of the circumstances of the case.

From the vessel first striking until she was lying in splinters along the beech not a living soul was seen or a voice heard. You confess that a line was thrown across her jib boom. Perhaps you are not aware that the next operation must be performed by the crew, and if they fail, what more can be done from the shore?

It is not my intention to occupy your space by recounting all the services of our Brigade since its formation in 1866, but will merely state that we have landed from wrecks at least 120 people.

The latter part of your paragraph casts a further slur on our character, that the Rockets were badly aimed and that a Royal Commission should enquire into this, and the whole question, commencing at South Shields and ending at Frazerburg.

As far as the Shields Brigade is concerned I say-not boastfully, but in defence, that it would be difficult to find a body of men who are more expert in firing Rockets or handling the Rocket Apparatus, and if your Commission ever comes to Shields it would be to see how thing can be properly done.

I do not know whether if I have given an undue weight to the words of your paper but false impressions get abroad and are spread all over the country from which innocent persons suffer. It is for the benefit of your readers and in justice to the Brigade that I trouble to reply to this.

To show a different view of the matter is taken by one of our local papers. I will conclude by quoting some remarks published this morning.

"The South Shields Life Brigade are worthy of the highest honour for their magnificent courage and promptness on the terrible morning of Wednesday. No one can have any conception of the dangers and difficulties they had to encounter, without going down to the South Pier, when the sea was comparatively calm and witnessing the wild and terrific scene which was then presented. We need not say much of the degeneracy of Englishmen when she can produce sons such as these"

COMMENTS ON THE LIFE SAVING APPARATUS INSTRUCTIONS

My dear Prouse

I am duly in receipt of your letter of Yesterday requesting my opinion as to paragraph 91 of the new L.S.A. Instructions.

The whole section under the head of "Wreck Service" does not appear to be clearly expressed of Brigades for Services rendered at Wrecks. I think it would be a step entirely opposed to our constitution, <u>volunteering</u> as we do to attend these occasions. The whole statue of Brigades would be lowered, and while some doubtless enrol themselves for the sake of payment. Yet the majority of Brigadesmen act from a further and purer motive and it might be the means of withdrawing from the movement the active sympathies of latter.

During the last 10 years the Annual Grant to defray the working expenses has worked very well and it would be a pity to disturb the arrangement.

Some years ago I suggested to the Board of Trade that the Annual Grant should be based on the Services at wrecks etc. say so much for each life saved. This would embrace the principle embodied in the institutions without direct personal payment. Any further expression of opinion I shall be glad to give if necessary.

I shall therefore be glad if you will appoint a time when we can meet you on the South Pier.

STORM GATE FOR THE PIER

To the Chairman and members of the piers Committee of the River Tyne Commissioners

Gentlemen

At the request of the Committee of the South Shields Life Brigade I beg respectfully to ask the River Tyne Commissioners to co - operate with us in order if possible to prevent the Public crowding on to the Pier in stormy weather especially at shipwrecks.

During the recent gales as well as in former occasions our operations have been very much impeded thereby and we suggest the advisability of fixing additional iron gates at a suitable place between the Brigade House and the jetty with instructions posted up forbidding anyone to pass without special leave.

WRECKS OF CLAREMONT – TYNE – FENNELLA – NEW CORNWALL –BLENHIEM & HERMAN SAUBER

South Shields December 30th 1876

"Sir,

In further reply to your letter of the 23rd instant, I have the honour to report that on Tuesday, the 19th instant, a most terrific gale from the south-east commenced on this part of the coast, and was attended by most disastrous results both to life and property, as the following condensed account will show. The South Shields Volunteer Life Brigade, as usual on such occasions, mustered in force at their watch-house to be ready for any emergency that might arise. The gale increased, and the sea rapidly rose on Wednesday to an alarming extent. On Thursday morning, about two o'clock, the lookout observed a vessel, the steamship Claremont, of Newcastle, making for the harbour. On nearing the bar, a succession of heavy seas struck her, and she became unmanageable, eventually stranding about two hundred yards on the south side of the pier. Meanwhile, the apparatus was taken along the pier, and in a few minutes a rocket line was thrown right amidships, but falling on the stays out of reach of the crew, a second was fired abaft the mainmast, by means of which the other gear was got on board, and all the crew, with a woman and child, numbering 21, safely landed They were taken to the watch-house and supplied with dry clothing and refreshments. As the morning advanced the wind and sea increased, with heavy rain. Shortly after six o'clock, the lights of another steamer were descried through the darkness, and in a very short space of time she was driven against the end of the pier. The apparatus was all in readiness and a rocket line fired on board. By this time the vessel had become submerged and the crew had taken to the rigging. The scene was now most heartrending; rocket after rocket went over the ship, the crew being unable to leave their positions to take advantage of them. Shortly after striking very little was to be seen but the bridge and the masts. The former soon washed away, and the latter followed in rapid succession, carrying with them the poor fellows who had gone there as a last refuge. She proved to be the steamship Tyne, of North Shields, with a crew of seventeen hands, one of whom was member of this brigade. They were all drowned. Just as the last rocket was fired over the Tyne, another screw-steamer struck the end of the pier. After backing off she was run full speed ahead to the beach, just clearing the sunken wreck, which had she struck might have been attended with serious loss of life. Two rockets were fired, both of which took the lines over the ship. They were not used; the crew, 20 in number, remaining on board till low water, when they got ashore and were supplied with necessary food and clothing the watch- house. This steamer was the Fenella, of London. After the breaking up of the Tyne a detachment of the brigade was told off to go along the beach in search of any bodies that might wash ashore. It was while in performance of this duty that one of the members was knocked down by a wave and had his leg broken. Other members also had narrow escapes. The storm still continued to rage, and at 3 o'clock in the afternoon the steamship Blenheim, of Hartlepool, struck the pier, and immediately parted amidships, the after part remaining fast and the fore part washing round the north end of the pier. The men on this piece of the vessel jumped on to the pier staging and were saved, except one who fell short and was drowned. A rocket was fired over the stern, and the remainder of the crew, six in number, safely landed. The total on board was twenty, nineteen of whom were saved and taken to the watch-house, where they were treated in the usual manner. The gear was collected together and kept at the end of the pier to be ready for any other emergency. Soon after the wreck of the Blenheim, a small schooner named the New Cornwall, of Barnstaple, got among the broken water, was capsized, and all the five number, perished. We could render no assistance, the melancholy sight being over in three or four minutes. Saturday the sea continued very high, with blinding showers of sleet. The members of the brigade were on duty, and about midnight another

screw-steamer was observed making very bad weather near the end of the pier. She was struck by heavy seas, and eventually stranded near the other vessels. The apparatus was taken down the pier and the first rocket fired right amidships. No action being taken by the crew a second was fired, by which the whip line was hauled on board. From some cause this got foul, and other three rockets were fired, by which a second whip line was hauled off, and also a hawser, but these also got entangled by the heavy sea and the large quantity of wreckage floating about.

After working with the lines for two hours it was determined to try the lifeboat. This proved successful, and all the crew safely landed and taken the watch-house. One of the life boat men got his leg broken while assisting to get the lifeboat launched This vessel was the Herman Sauber, of Hamburg, with a crew of 19. By this time most of the members were nearly worn out with the exertions of the last two or three days, but as the weather still continued stormy some remained on duty all through Christmas Eve. On Christmas morning about half-past three o'clock, the brig Mary, of Whitby, was observed to go ashore on the Herd Sand. The signal was instantly given to the lifeboats. The brigade ran along with heaving lines and life-buoys, but the crew was taken out by the lifeboat. Such is a brief account of the most fearful and disastrous gale that has occurred, here since the formation of this brigade, and one that will never be forgotten by those who witnessed it. We have landed by the apparatus 27 people, besides assisting the others to the best of our ability. We have also received 80 shipwrecked persons into the watch-house, providing them with all necessary comforts, for which they have been very grateful. In conclusion, I think it my duty to add that the officers of coastguard have been most assiduous and attentive to their duties, and are well worthy of special recognition. I would also respectfully suggest that the regulation quantity of stores at this station should be increased.

January 4th 1877

Sir,

In accordance with the request contained in your letter (M 16233/1876) I have forwarded by passenger train to your store keeper one of the Helmets worn by the Members of the So Shields Brigade at Rocket Drills and wrecks.

As it belongs to one of the men and as we have no spare ones please return it as soon as practicable.

From our experience of these Hats, I think if the question were to come up for consideration again, we should be inclined to make a change, not perhaps as to shape, but material.

In designing the Helmet we tried to accomplish three things 1st to be waterproof, 2nd to be light in weight 3rd to be light in colour so as to be easily distinguishable in the dark. They are not perfectly watertight and those that have seen much service are soiled and out of shape. If the outer covering could be replaced with a glazed material it might prove more serviceable.

My report of the recent wrecks was forwarded on the 30th ult.
